Coach Herman Boone, as portrayed by Denzel Washington in "Remember the Titans" 8:00 p.m., Chesapeake Rooms

In 1971, Herman Boone faced the challenge of a lifetime, and his inspirational story was captured in the Disney film *Remember the Titans* starring Academy Award-winner Denzel Washington.



Racial tensions ran high in Alexandria, Virginia, as three schools were newly integrated to form the T.C. Williams High School. It was from this union that the Titan football team was created. The former rivalries between the schools coupled with the strain between the black and white players resulted in a team that was far from united. Tensions escalated when Boone, assistant coach of the former T.C. Williams High School, was named head coach of the Titans, passing over Bill Yoast, the local favorite and successful head coach of the former white Hammond High. Yoast's supporters were angered by Boone's appointment, which was seen as a gesture of goodwill to the black community.

Remarkably, the two coaches were able to put aside their prejudices, and in doing so they unified their players to form a team whose common vision was to respect each other and win football games. At the same time, through the game of football, Boone and Yoast were able to help their small Virginian community put aside their intolerance and join together to support their children. The Titans became one of the best teams in Virginia, compiling a 13-0 record and went on to win the state championship. 

Paper: Mapping Dimensional Terrains In 2005 Lecture: University Union, Chesapeake Room; 7 p.m.

Workshop: Center For the Arts Room 217; 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Lecture: Helen Frederick, Director of Pyramid Atlantic Art Center and Associate Professor, George Mason University, will connect the East and the West, as related to traditional and contemporary works in paper. She will explore ways to recycle, mold, suspend and illuminate paper as a substance from the point of view of an artist who is involved in the historical and collaborative aspects of making paper, prints and three-dimensional objects. The lecture will explore many artists' work and discuss what attributes of paper have captured their imagination for installations and personal dimensional works, among other applications.

Workshop: "A Cognitive Approach to Making Paper for Three Dimensional forms"

This workshop is seen as shared exploration between the participants to mine ideas for dimensional paper sculptures Sheet forming with aspects of pulp painting, watermarking and the use of over beaten fibers will be explored. This will be followed by a demonstration of forming sheets over several armature forms (wire and bamboo) or layering them into negative molds. Discussion and examples of types of papers and ways these papers can be inventively used in the three dimensional forms will be incorporated in the session (instructor will bring various examples). Towson University Spring Speaker Series presents: Martin Luther King, III

Martin Luther King, III, the eldest son of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., has taken the torch lit by his father and continued the quest for equality and justice for all people. Since early adulthood, he has motivated audiences around the world with his poignant messages of hope and responsibility. His most popular message is "The Dream Deferred, " an examination of the goals of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in today's society. His vision of a positive

future built upon the principles taught by his father has touched thousands from Mozambique to Mississippi.

A human rights advocate, community activist, and political leader, Mr. King has been actively involved in significant policy initiatives to maintain the fair and equitable treatment of citizens at home and abroad. His commitment to worldwide humanitarian concerns was exemplified in the late 1970's when he was asked to represent President Jimmy Carter in two official delegations to promote peace in foreign countries. Later, in 1984, as a member of the Board of Directors of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change, Mr. King ventured to five poverty and drought-stricken African nations on a fact-finding tour. The outcome of the tour was the creation of the Africa Initiative, a program developed to end starvation in Africa. In the 1980's, he turned his attention and his action to the injustices of South Africa and the freedom of Nelson Mandela; while in the 1990's he has addressed the moral and political dilemmas of third-world nations such as Haiti and Nigeria. 
